Under provisions in the state constitution, passage of a constitutional amendment requires at least 55 percent of the votes cast.


Statewide Ballot Initiatives – Statutory Changes

Under provisions in the state constitution, passage of a statutory change requires at least 50% +1 of the votes cast.



The Colorado General Assembly is made up of 100 members, 35 Senators and 65 Representatives.

Republican Party gained three seats, removing the Democrats of their previously held supermajority, they are now one seat shy.

The Colorado Senate will remain in Democratic hands with a mix of new and familiar faces in the chamber following the November 5th election. There were seventeen State Senate seats are up for re-election for a four-year term. The remaining seats of the 35-member chamber will be up in 2026. The Colorado House will also remain in Democratic control. All 65 seats are up for re-election every two years in Colorado. The following races were deemed competitive with the following results. Two races, HD 16 and HD 19 were so close, there will be a mandatory recount in the coming weeks. Should these two race results hold, the Colorado House Democrats will maintain a healthy 43-22 majority but will be short of a supermajority going into the 75th General Assembly.

Expected Vacancies

Senator Kevin Van Winkle (R) who holds SD 30 has just won his election on Nov. 8th for Douglas County Commissioner. We expect him to resign his Senate seat in early January. Senator Chris Hansen (D) who holds SD 31 has announced that he's accepted a job and will be resigning from the legislature January 9th. Senator Janet Buckner (D), SD 29, also announced her resignation in November to be effective January 9th, the day after being sworn in. Each seat will require vacancy committees to be formed to fill the seats, leaving uncertainty on who will fill SD 30, SD 31, and SD 29 for the remainder of the 2025 Legislative Session.
