Our community was delighted to once again host students from across the globe at Otero College. With over 65 international students enrolled, representing 25 countries and participating in a variety of programs, including nursing and sports teams like soccer, basketball, and golf. Their presence had a significant impact on campus life, as they lived and learned alongside the local community.

International Foods Night took place on November 14th. This 29th annual event invited everyone to celebrate the international students with a feast featuring dishes from various countries and a new multicultural dessert bar. Local donations of beer and wine supported scholarships for international programs. Students showcased their talents from their home countries, and the event included a performance by the mariachi band, Mariachi Lobos, with Jace Honey serving as the auctioneer to raise funds for scholarships. The planning committee expressed excitement about the festivities and the celebration of diversity within the community.

The Otero Players Student Showcase took place on November 16 at 7 p.m. and November 17 at 2 p.m. at the Picketwire Center for Performing and Visual Arts. It was a presentation of scenes, songs, and monologues performed by current and former Otero College students. The showcase featured performances from Carolina Estrada Cortez, Phoebe Frausto, Alyson Greenlund, Sophia Lague, Heather Pidcock-Reed, and Griffin Snyder. The event concluded with the debut performance of a student-written play: Abbie Hawkins' *Monopoly of Errors*, presented by Griffin Snyder. Admission to the event was free.

The Medical Laboratory Technician Program competed in a Cell Bowl sponsored by the American Society of Clinical Pathologists. This is a national tournament between 38 teams of both bachelor's degree (Medical Laboratory Scientist) and associate's degree (Medical Laboratory Technician) programs from across the US. The object of the competition is to achieve the highest cell quiz score by identifying hematological blood cells. The goal is to have fun while preparing for the ASCP Board exams and learning cell identification.

Otero's MLT Program once again made the playoffs as one of 12 teams. The contest consisted of 6 rounds and the Otero program made it to the 5th round. Unfortunately, they were eliminated during this round, but Otero made a strong showing and should be commended.
