### President Dr. DeSanctis Visits White House Reception

Dear CityHawks,

Last week, I had the privilege of joining about 200 higher education and workforce leaders invited to the White House for a Reception on Career Pathways, an event preceding the U.S. Department of Education's "Classroom to Career Summit." This gathering brought together voices from across the nation-Cabinet members, Administration officials, state and local elected officials, community college presidents, K-12 leaders, unions, workforce development leaders from the nine White House Workforce Hubs, business leaders, representatives of philanthropic organizations, students, and other communities across the country-all united by a shared purpose: to expand career pathways and empower individuals to thrive in high-demand industries.

At the reception, we had the honor of hearing directly from President Joe Biden and First Lady Dr. Jill Biden, who shared the administration's vision for <u>Investing in America</u>. Their remarks, alongside those of the president's

cabinet, highlighted historic efforts to create millions of good-paying jobs—many of which do not require a four-year degree—and to expand opportunities in fields like infrastructure, clean energy, and advanced manufacturing.

Through the American Rescue Plan, more than \$80 billion has been committed to strengthening and diversifying the workforce, supporting high-quality free community college programs in high-demand fields, expanding registered apprenticeships, and attracting and retaining a skilled, diverse workforce in critical industries.

### CCD's Engineering Momentum STEM Core Program

Imagine being part of a program that not only teaches you advanced math but also connects you to industry giants like NASA—while offering the support you need to overcome life's barriers. That's exactly what Community College of Denver's (CCD) Engineering Momentum: STEM Core program offers to underserved and underrepresented students, including minorities, women, and veterans. The program's primary goal? To prepare students for Calculus within a year, setting them up for long-term success in math and engineering.

#### Holistic Support for Students

People learn in various ways, and CCD's Engineering Momentum program recognizes this. Students work in cohorts, taking classes together for the full year-long program, fostering a sense of community and collaboration. Along with working together, students receive weekly support from an academic counselor who attends their math classes, ensuring they stay accountable and overcome any challenges.

Celeste Pegues-Rios is CCD's Engineering Momentum STEM Core Student Support Specialist. "My role as the Student Support Specialist for the Engineering Momentum Grant/ STEM Core program is to show up for my students in a more holistic way than they would get from an average advisor. I am in their math classes holding them accountable to showing up for their education and helping them navigate life barriers that may prevent them for making their education a priority," said Pegues-Rios. Pegues-Rios also crafts and curates workshops, field trips, and interactive learning experiences that give students a hands-on look into the industry.



#### **Real World Connections**

In addition to the academic support, the program introduces students to industry professionals through guest speakers, allowing them to gain insights into the day-to-day realities of their future careers. This exposure can profoundly impact a student's career path.

CCD's Engineering Momentum program goes even further by offering internships, guided tours of leading organizations like NASA, and transfer guidance to notable four-year universities such as the University of Colorado Boulder and Denver. These connections between the classroom and the real world equip students with both the knowledge and the experience they need to thrive.

#### A Transformative Student Experience

"This program has provided me with the support I need to succeed as a non-traditional student who is returning to school in my 20s," commented Therese Stewart, CCD student. Stewart plans to continue her higher education journey at a four-year university for computer science or applied mathematics.

At a time when conversations about diversity, equity, and inclusion are more important than ever, The Thanksgiving Play offered a timely and entertaining exploration of these themes. ### Provost Announces Launch of CCD's Al Governance Committee

Community College of Denver (CCD) is embracing the future of technology with the formation of an AI Governance Committee, a strategic step aimed at integrating artificial intelligence into the college's operations, education, and culture. Co-led by Provost Peter Lindstrom and Director of Information Technology Leisa Schievelbein, the initiative builds on the foundational work of CCD's AI Task Force and sets the stage for transformative innovation.

This committee's goals are clear: to create a phased AI program and five-year roadmap that align with CCD's mission, strategic plan, and core values, focusing on ethical growth, enhanced operational efficiency, and equity-driven outcomes.

The initiative was inspired by insights gained from various AI summits and conferences attended by college leaders. These events highlighted the need for a structured approach to harness the power of generative AI. "This committee is a critical step toward fostering innovation while upholding our commitment to ethical leadership and educational excellence," said Lindstrom. "AI is transforming how we work, learn, and teach, and it's vital that we approach this transformation with intention and purpose."

The committee's first-year goals include developing a CCD-specific AI mission statement, conducting a stakeholder needs assessment, and piloting projects to explore AI's potential. These efforts will be guided by a comprehensive ethics framework and a detailed program plan, ensuring AI's integration aligns with CCD's values.



To ensure diverse input, the committee is seeking volunteers from across the college. Participation does not require prior experience with AI—anyone with an interest in shaping CCD's approach is encouraged to join.

This proactive approach underscores CCD's commitment to innovation and ethical leadership, setting a precedent for how educational institutions can adapt to the evolving technological landscape.

### Create Education Without Barriers Through Transformational Partners

### Strengthening Pathways: CCD and MSU Denver Collaborate to Enhance Transfer Success

Community College of Denver (CCD) and Metropolitan State University of Denver (MSU Denver) are taking significant steps to improve transfer pathways between the two institutions, focusing on seamless student transitions and shared success. These efforts include a joint application for the prestigious Cohort 4 Aspen Transfer Intensive and the planning of an inaugural CCD + MSU Transfer Summit scheduled for February 25, 2025.

As partners, CCD and MSU Denver have applied to join the 2025-26 Aspen-AASCU Transfer Student Success Intensive, a year-long initiative designed to advance transfer practices between community colleges and state universities. Only 10 institution pairs are selected each year to participate in the program, which is generously funded by Ascendium.

The Transfer Intensive offers monthly workshops, expert consulting, and opportunities to craft a Strategic Transfer Excellence Plan (STEP). This plan showcases each team's unique transfer partnership agreement while outlining future reforms to enhance transfer student outcomes. Acceptance into this initiative would be a testament to CCD and MSU Denver's commitment to fostering student success.

"We believe we are strong applicants for this opportunity," said CCD President Dr. Marielena DeSanctis. "This program represents an exciting step toward aligning our institutions to better support transfer students and improve their journey."



Building on our shared commitment to improving transfer pathways, CCD and MSU Denver are also organizing the first-ever CCD + MSU Transfer Summit. Taking place on February 25, 2025, this summit will bring together leadership, faculty, and staff from both institutions to engage in collaborative action planning.

By pursuing these initiatives, CCD and MSU Denver reaffirm their shared vision to create a more equitable and efficient transfer process. From simplifying credit transfer to improving data sharing and aligning career pathways, this partnership is focused on ensuring every transfer student has the support they need to succeed.

The results of the Aspen Transfer Intensive application will be announced in January, and momentum is already building for the February summit. Together, CCD and MSU Denver are paving the way for a future where transfer students thrive.
