MCC SBCCOE Report - March 2025

Transform the student experience.

Seven MCC students competed in the SkillsUSA Region 3 Collision Repair and Refinishing competition. Four students placed and received medals: Kaden Dykes placed first in High School Collision Repair; Eric Lurbe placed second in High School Collision Repair; Osmar Ramirez placed third in High School Collision Repair; and Jorge Guzman placed first in High School Refinishing. In addition, Markley Motors of Fort Collins offered one of the competing students a position with them beginning this summer.

Transform our own workforce experience.

MCC Precision Ag Faculty Bill Miller and STEM Coaches Gavin Fitzgerald and Chelsea Crandall were recognized with a CSU TAPS (Testing Ag Performance Solutions) Award. The program is part of the Irrigation Innovation Consortium program, which focuses on innovative work to support agricultural solutions. MCC's project involved a limited irrigation system, where they used only 11 inches of water for the entire growing season. Twenty-seven teams competed, with the MCC team placing second in the "Most Efficient Farm" category. MCC plans to join the program again and involve more students, including organizing trips to CSU's Agricultural Research, Development, and Educational Center (ARDEC).

MCC Communications Faculty, Amanda Czuprynski, won three awards for papers she submitted to the Broadcast Education Association. She took first place in the Multicultural Studies Division, second place in the History Division's open category, and placed in the Scholar-to-Scholar Research competition.

They toured the facility and explored the hospital's efforts to enhance healthcare in northeast Colorado.

The actors will portray real women from the 1800's who left their mark on the west, including Rosamond Underwood, a socialite turned pioneer schoolteacher; Mary Rippon, a professor; Bertha Spears, a Harvey Girl; and Mabel Dodge Luhan, a philanthropist/Bohemian rebel.

STEM series presentations were provided by Dr. Kai Kopecky on "Rising to the Challenge: How Global Change is Reshaping the Resilience of our Ecosystems and Ourselves" on February 25 and by Dr. Thomas Albrecht on "The Nuclear Renaissance" on March 4. The presentations were free and open to students, staff, and the public.

The Centennial Area Health Education Center (CAHEC) partnered with MCC to offer free training on dementia care to nursing students and the community on March 6.

MCC Title III STEM Staff facilitated a STEM family night at Pioneer Elementary School in Fort Morgan for students and their parents on February 20.

MCC has formed an Artificial Intelligence Taskforce to address the quickly changing world of AI.
