<u>Education for All</u> – Increase equitable, learner-centered environments that support all learners meeting their goals.









Selection was based on the score earned in the All-USA Academic Team competition, for which nearly 2,100 applications were received this year. Nominations were evaluated on academic achievement, leadership, service, and significant endeavors. Evangelista received the highest score in Colorado! This program is sponsored by the Coca-Cola Foundation and the Coca-Cola Scholars Foundation, with additional support provided by the American Association of Community Colleges and Phi Theta Kappa. As a New Century Transfer Pathway Scholar, Evangelista will receive a \$2,250 scholarship and will be recognized at Phi Theta Kappa's Presidents Breakfast held during the AACC Convention in Nashville, Tennessee.

TSC Artist Lecture series is a monthly lecture that is in collaboration with the A.R. Mitchell Museum of Western Art and Kuehl Fine Art at the A.R. Mitchell Museum. In March the featured artist was Jonathan McAfee a Colorado based painter known for his bold, expressive approach to portraiture. Lunch -n- Learn speaker in March was Melody Delmar with the Colorado Division of Criminal Justice, Office of the Liaison for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Relatives (OMMIR). She shared with both the Valley Campus and the Trinidad Campus the mission and work of the OMMIR. They help connect families with resources, provide information on how to report a missing or murdered loved one, work to increase awareness regarding missing and murdered indigenous people, develop partnerships with Tribal Law Enforcement and collaborate with state and local partners to develop training.
