# **Registration & Student Support**

## Pathfinders for Autism Training

On April 1<sup>st</sup>, the CARE hosted a training conducted by Pathfinders for Autism with a total of 65 faculty and staff. This training session focused on working with neurodivergent students and provided practical strategies and tools for working with students to create an inclusive and support learning environment for all.

Faculty and staff shared that even though they very familiar with people with autism, and some even have family members with ASD, they still learned several things from Neal Lichter, Program Director with Pathfinders for Autism.

Pathfinders for Autism was established in 2000 by parents of children with autism seeking to educate and train the community to support and improve the lives of individuals with autism and their families throughout the lifespan. This organization has grown to be Maryland's largest autism organization.

This is Neal's fourth time visiting campus to provide this training.





#### **Athletics**

**Baseball** – The season is in full swing and the team is currently 23-8 going into the weekend (4/5-6/25) and are ranked 3<sup>rd</sup> in Region 20 Division II with 25 games left to play in the regular season.

**Softball** – The softball team is also mid-way through their season with a record of 6-14. Unfortunately, we have had some injuries to the team and have limited depth at the pitching position, but the team is hitting well and remains competitive in their games. They have 14 games left in the season before playoffs begin.

Men's and Women's Outdoor Track and Field – The season began on March 21st and the teams have competed at two meets so far; University of Richmond, and Bridgewater College. They travel to Towson University on 4/4/25. We have had some standout performances at these meets. At Bridgewater College on 3/29 Hagerstown CC finished 1<sup>st</sup> 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> in both the men's 100 and the men's 200. We were the only community college competing in a field of 4-year school athletes!

**Golf** – Our Golf team is off to an excellent start! Both individually and as a team. They opened their season with a home match at MD National. As a team we finished second by two strokes to Anne Arundel CC. Individually Austin May won the match shooting a 76. The next top finishers placed 6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, and 10<sup>th</sup>. The team won the second match of the year at College of Southern MD, beating Anne Arundel by 4 strokes. Individually, our top 5 golfers shot 80, 80, 82, 87, 106.

# Career Development, Internship and Job Services

#### **Internships**

Ten for-credit internship applications meeting eligibility requirements have been received for the summer semester. Applicant degree programs include: Business Administration, Cybersecurity, Digital Forensics, Electrical Engineering Technology, Human Services, and Substance Abuse Counseling.

#### Career Closet

The Spring 2025 Career Closet Pop-Up Shop event was held March 18, 19 and 20 in the Student Center, Upper Dining area. There was a total of 222 visitors and 594 items distributed. Students had the opportunity to select up to five free items each day. Students shared the following feedback regarding appreciation and how they will benefit from the items they selected:

#### Career Expo

The Washington County Career Expo held on March 28th was another huge success! In addition to the Career Expo showcasing 120 vendors that included local employers, local 4-year colleges, and workforce development organizations; this event also included the HCC Open House, which featured 50 HCC tables that offered information and resources about HCC programs, services, and job opportunities. Overall, there were over 1,500 participants at the event, which included over 1,300 event attendees and approximately 250 representatives. Of the 1,300 event attendees, 300 were WCPS students that came by bus from each of the 12 county high schools. Event attendees included: 23% high school students; 16% HCC students; and 61% general public job seekers.

While it is early to know detailed outcomes that will result from the event, there was great energy and engagement between vendor representatives and attendees. Here are a few outcomes from the Vendor Participation Survey that are noted to-date:

- 33% of employers anticipate hiring from the event.
- 55% of employers met with 21 or more job seekers.
- 33% of employers solicited applications for job opportunities.

Two of our PTK officers and All-Maryland Academic Team Members, **Scott Petty** and **Thomas Weidmyer** (who were present to meet the board back in January), have been awarded two of PTK's national scholarships.

**Scott** has been recognized as 2025 New Century Transfer Pathway Scholar after receiving the second-highest score among all applicants in the state of Maryland. He will be recognized at our upcoming Middle States regional conference and will receive his award, including a \$2,250 scholarship, at the Phi Theta Kappa's Presidents Breakfast held during the AACC Convention in Nashville on Tuesday, April 15, 2025.



Workforce Solutions and Continuing Education

- WSCE continues to award scholarships to workforce development students via several different grants including:
  - MHEC's Workforce Development Sequence Scholarship funded 59 students for a total of \$42,000
  - o Rural Maryland Grant funded 71 students for a total of \$91,151
  - The Radcliffe Foundation Grant funded 16students including individuals in the Career Readiness program for a total of \$16,623

#### • WSCE Allied Health

- WCPS CNA/GNA completed Clinicals in February with 100% pass rate. Students are scheduled for Credentia Skills exams May 5<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup>.
- Massage Therapy curriculum developer is currently working on course descriptions and textbook selections. The anticipated start date is January 2026. Facilities renovated CPB 164 to relocate the Medical Assisting program. CPB 161 was also renovated to become the new Massage Therapy program classroom and open clinic.
- HCC/Washington County DES Paramedic program agreement has been updated to meet the requirements for accreditation. Review with WCDES is underway.
- Paramedic program will offer 5 open enrollment seats to be filled by students not affiliated with the WCDES. All students in the program will be charged tuition that can be funded through employers or scholarships and grant opportunities.
- Asian American Center of Frederick hybrid Medical Assisting contract training has been postponed due to grant funding freeze. The program will now be offered in June 2025. WSCE will add an open enrollment MA cohort to begin in April 2025.
- CNA/GNA Off Campus Coordinator, Rick Beacham, is currently teaching a cohort of CNA/GNA students for the Asian American Center of Frederick contract training.
- Nurse Refresher begins April 7<sup>th</sup> with 8 students. We are working to hire additional instructors for this program to increase offerings in the future.
- Clinical Contract Coordinator, covering Allied Health, Health Sciences, and Nursing divisions begins on April 14<sup>th</sup>.
- WSCE Allied Health will be combining pinning ceremonies with Health Science Division.

#### • Summer Youth Programs Formally College for Kids:

- The Summer Youth Program registration is going well, with seven full classes and six classes with only a seat or two remaining.
- Classes in theater, computers, technology, and robotics are highly popular with the students as registration is the highest within those classes.
- Discovery Academy, aimed at high school students, expanded this summer to include business and criminal justice and back by popular demand is blacksmithing.

• College for Kids program expanded this summer to include first grade, and registration is going well for these classes.

#### • Personal Enrichment:

- Students from Personal Enrichment are registering more and more with new classes being offered. Registration for nature photography and new history courses is being met with full classes, an increase from years prior.
- Our students interested in travel will take part in a trip to Annapolis on a May Day excursion.
- With the precedent success of cross-listing classes with the arts department, talks will begin with the humanities department to cross-list some writing courses for students.

# • Business, Certification and Licensure:

- We partnered with the Hagerstown Housing Authority to offer career readiness courses at their Parkside Community Center. Classes started April 1.
- o Problem Solving Training for Parker Plastics starts April 11.
- The International Women's Day event in partnership with Prime Time for Women saw almost 80 people on campus to celebrate over 2-days.
- Our Nonprofit Management course had 12 people attending across the varies classes.
- O SEK has added additional dates to their contract. They will be on campus May 5-7, 14-16, 19-21 and June 26 for tax training.
- We've hired several new instructors, Lisa Dougherty for Advanced Grant Writing, Amanda Burkett for Vet Assisting and Tara Sargent to teach as part of our Management Bootcamp program.
- A ParaProfessional course is slated to begin in the fall. The open enrollment course will also accommodate the Integrated Education and Training Program (IETP) from the PALS office. A curriculum developer and instructor has been identified, and funding for curriculum development is being funded by the Rural Maryland Grant.
- We are currently in the process of developing a customized training for Pennland Pure in Hancock. They're looking to offer leadership and soft skills training to their management staff.
- We will start an AI course for small businesses this fall. The course will focus on practical uses of AI tools to streamline tasks, create content and make better business decisions.
- All workshops for the Nonprofit Symposium: Catalysts for Community on May 2 have been chosen. The keynote speaker will be Wendy Wolff of Maryland Nonprofits. She'll share insights on building vibrant workplaces.

#### • Transportation/Trades/Tech:

- Under the Rural MD grant, we have started another CDL class with ACM in Cumberland; working on the process to donate older training vehicle (bus) to ADM so they will have a self-sustaining program.
- PALS started an IETP for transportation pathways with nine participants; students will go through forklift and CDL truck driver training.
- HCC instructor attended reserve fire engine training with Washington County EMS last week; currently have an EMS student in day trucking class.
- Training held at Parker Plastic for forklift and aerial lift train-the-trainer programs.
- QuickBooks in-person training is back with classes starting on April 1.
- Motorcycle Safety season is running well with classes filled in to June; new motorcycle purchased.
- Assisted in submitting a grant for Maryland Labor related to skilled trades; letter of intent submitted for 2026 ARC grant for equipment primarily at Bowman training center; quotes forwarded by grants for next phase of 2025 ARC application for transportation.
- Barr Construction Institute graduation for Year 4 Registered Apprentices will be held on Friday, May 16. Dr. Ohl-Gigliotti is forming a planning committee for the event that will feature beer and BBQ at the new Northern Avenue center.
