Athletics

Men's Basketball – The men's team is in the home stretch of the regular season with 7 games remaining. We are currently 13-9 overall and in second place in Division I Region 20. Our Regional/District playoffs will be held at the site of the higher seed between Monroe University, NY, and Harcum College, PA March 6-8.

Women's Basketball – The women's team is currently 6-11 in their rebuilding year. They have 8 games left in the regular season and are currently ranked 7th in Division II Region 20. Their playoffs will be held at Howard Community College on March 8 & 9.

Baseball – The baseball team began preseason practice in the ARCC on January 13th. This year's team has a 31-man roster featuring 13 freshmen and 18 sophomores. The team is scheduled to play three regional double headers before heading to Jackie Robinson Training Facility in Florida, where they will play 12 games during HCC's spring break.

Softball – The softball team also began preseason practice on January 13th. The team has a 14-woman roster, featuring 13 freshmen and 1 sophomore. The team is scheduled to play 2 double headers before their spring break trip to Lexington, South Carolina where they will play eight games at the Fast Pitch Dreams Classic facility.

Men's and Women's Indoor Track & Field – The track and field team is halfway through its indoor season with several members of the team achieving National qualifying times and heights. Sophomore, Aiden Faith is continuing HCC's high jump success by winning both the Shenandoah Invitational high jump competition as well as the VMI Invitational with a winning jump of 5'5". She is currently ranked 3rd in the NJCAA. Freshman, Michaela Gross placed second in the 5,000 meters at VMI finishing only behind an NCAA Division 1 runner from East Tennessee State, with a time of 18:32.31. She is currently ranked 2nd in the NJCAA. Sophomore pole vaulter, Michaela Carney placed 2nd at the Shenandoah Invitational and won the Larry Sharpe Invitational with a national qualifying height of 10'6". Freshman, Furious Trammel won the VMI Invitational in the 400 meters with a time of 48.39. Freshman, Austin McCoy placed 3rd in the same race with a time of 49.33.

Men's Golf – The Men's Golf team has a roster of 10 this year and will open their 6game season hosting the other Region 20 teams at our home course, Maryland National, on March 27th.

Registration & Student Support

This info is to provide a credit retention update from the PIE office which shows positive trends for both our full and part-time students. These are official IPEDS retention rates calculated as fall-to-fall retention for first-time, full-time students. Our most recently

published cohort is the Fall 22 cohort (retained through Fall 23). While there are many ways to look at retention, using this IPEDS measure allows for consistency over time and consistency with external publications. The table below has our rates over time, along with the four-year average, which is the required disclosure for the federal Student-Right-to-Know Act. HCC's credit student retention has rose by 5.6% over the last four years to 67%.

Registration and Student Support also conducted a pilot program in the fall of 2024 that targeted a small group of at-risk students, those with below a 2.5 high school GPA, to provide on-going and intentional communication via text. Specifically, the Student Support Advisors tailored weekly support messages, including reminders to utilize mental health resources around midterms and finals. The office is currently in the process of collecting completion and retention data to determine the impact of this outreach.

HCC ranked 42nd out of 550 institutions of higher learning that included both 2- and 4-year schools. HCC ranked number 2 out of all community colleges. We placed 14th for participation with 112 students participating!

Title III Updates

Faculty Mentoring has been the identified model under the Title III grant to improve retention. There were 32 students who were connected with faculty mentors in fall 2024. For spring 2025, notifications were recently sent to 970 eligible students (completed 30 or more credits, not already matched with a mentor) and so far, we have received 16 requests for faculty mentors.

Phi Theta Kappa

PTK students participated in the Hagerstown Community College's Spring 2025 Regional Transfer Fair that was held on Monday, February 17th from 10am - 1pm in our AC&T Student Center! Transfer institutions who recognize PTK scholars with scholarship funding had a golden placard card on their table.

A note from our past PTK Vice President and 2024 Hites Transfer Scholarship recipient, Haley Himes, who now attends Frostburg University. Haley says, "I am loving Frostburg in downtown. I finished the fall semester with a 4.0 GPA and was on the Dean's list. Then, I received an email from Frostburg's chapter of the National Society of Leadership and Success which only a small percentage of Frostburg students get accepted to and only 8% of students nationwide get accepted into. So, I am very excited about that."

Perkins MSDE-Maryland of Administration (MOA) Audit

Earlier in February, MSDE auditors completed audits respective to both academic and students services support and ensuring ADA compliance is provided within facilities. This audit resulted in positive findings with minimal recommendations for updates or changes. A final report is expected early March.

Faculty Assembly Report from January

Alicia Drumgoole, Associate Professor of English Composition, was chosen to be the keynote speaker at the Wilson College Writers Colloquium on February 8, 2025. She will be talking about using your own life to tell stories. She has been speaking at this event since 2017.

Tom Crawford, Professor of Mathematics has received a perfect score on his QM certification of MAT 115, Quantitative Reasoning

Emily Boward, Instructor of Biology/Forensic Science, has passed QM certification for her Forensic Science course (BTC 103).

Jeannine Stonestreet, Assistant Professor of Education/Psychology. Her Educational Psychology course (PSY 203) is now a Master Class. This is the last course of hers that will be going through the QM process.

Workforce Solutions and Continuing Education

- WSCE continues to award scholarships to workforce development students via several different grants including:
 - MHEC's Workforce Development Sequence Scholarship funded 43 students for a total of \$21,464
 - Due to MHEC error, second allocation of this fundings has been delayed
 - Rural Maryland Grant funded 82 students for a total of \$84,000
 - The Radcliffe Foundation Grant funded 9 students including 7 HCC incubator clients for an Entrepreneurship program for a total of \$11,522

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• WSCE Allied Health

- WCPS CNA/GNA students to complete clinicals by February 14, 2025
- WCPS CNA/GNA program planning meeting scheduled at Smithsburg High School February 14, 2025.
- New Dental Hygiene Prescription writing course scheduled for February 22, 2025 the class is currently full with 30/30 students registered. Additional offerings have been added for Spring 2025
- Massage Therapy curriculum developer is currently working on course descriptions and textbook selections. Anticipated start date is January 2026. Facilities is working to renovate CPB 164 to relocate the Medical Assisting program. CPB 161 will be renovated to become the new Massage Therapy program classroom and open clinic. By doing much of the work in-house, we will save an estimated \$30,000 in renovation costs since CPB 161 already meets all water and electrical requirements.
- Washington County DES Paramedic program agreement is being updated to meet the requirements for accreditation. Review with WCDES is scheduled for February 12, 2025.
- Asian American Center of Frederick hybrid Medical Assisting contract training has been postponed due to grant funding freeze. Program will now

be offered in June 2025. WSCE will add an open enrollment MA cohort to begin in April 2025. 10 students ready to begin with foundations in March.

- Signed contract with Asian American Center of Frederick to provide Healthcare Pre-Apprenticeship programs starting in February.
- CNA/GNA Off Campus Coordinator, Rick Beacham, is completing clinical rotations for several students who faced extraordinary circumstances that prevented the completion of their CNA/GNA clinical program. Once they complete their required clinical hours and skills with Mr. Beacham, these students will be permitted to proceed to skills testing and licensure application.

• Summer Youth Programs Formally College for Kids

- The Summer Youth Program VIP was held on February 1, 2025. 75-100 community members attended, and we received 21 registrations, totaling \$11,630 in gross revenue.
- Parents and students reacted positively to introducing their children to camp before registration when the children were nervous and to register before general registration.
- Seven of our families were very appreciative and took advantage of our payment plans.
- Summer Youth Program general registration will open on February 12, and we are recruiting qualified instructors through various avenues, including social media lead generation. Our application is live on our website and we have been receiving applications already.
- Last year's team lead is returning and is helping our recruiting efforts. She is working with current instructors to acquire lesson plans and material lists and develop parent handouts to reinforce learning.

• Personal Enrichment

- Students from Personal Enrichment are enjoying and registering for our new Introduction to Stained Glass class. Each time this is offered, our classes are waitlisted, with students eager to register for the class.
- Our writing courses with award-winning international author Lisa Proulx are gaining in popularity, and students find the class information helpful during their book authoring.
- The senior class offerings are increasing in registration, and we are working to expand our Personal Enrichment offerings through the daytime.

• Business, Certification and Licensure

- Our Nonprofit management course started February 4; there are 12 students are registered across the series.
- Our Management Bootcamp series is starting February 11.
- We have a contract training course on social media with the Business Incubator this week.

- We are working with DSS to offer courses such as a drop-in Career Readiness Course for their clients.
- We're in the processes of developing courses with Tech High School's cosmetology instructors to offer CEUs to local cosmetologists. This is a new state requirement for all cosmetologist to gain 6 hours of professional development each year beginning in 2026.
- We are working with Brighter Horizons to potentially offer a train-thetrainer workshop for their financial literacy course geared toward women in addiction recovery.
- We are partnering with Maureen Kolb, incubator manager, to set up courses for her Start Up Week Events May 6, 7 & 8.
- The International Women's Day event has been expanded to include an afternoon of Friday, March 7th workshops in addition to their Saturday, March 8th event. Friday workshops will be held in CPB.

• Transportation/Trades/Tech

- Head Start of Washington County has asked for a proposal on School bus endorsement training. HS would supply the vehicle to satisfy the Entry Level Driver Training Requirements.
- Oak Hill Apartments has requested discussions on HVAC training for maintenance technicians for their facilities.
- Staff met with Pulling for Veterans, an organization that helps with PTSD issues. Organization has MDOT grant to pay tuition for Motorcycle Safety classes this season.
- In addition to the CDL B training that they are working through, 4 students from Grace House, a new addiction recovery facility, completed our Forklift course on Friday (1/31).
- Manufacturing Roundtable meeting held on January 31 in the conference center with healthy participation by employers. Civic Works presented on the new state program that provides paid internships for individuals in their gap year post high school.


