#### **Description of Proposed Program**

The Community Counseling graduate program is a two-tiered entry-level professional training program comprised of the M.S. Community Counseling and Ed.S. Professional Community Counseling (LPC Track). Admission into the Ed.S. Professional Community Counseling (LPC Track) Program requires completion of the M.S. Community Counseling Program. In addition, candidates must be approved for admission by the Education Department. Department bases its decision in part on the candidate's overall performance in the M.S. Community Counseling program. For those students completing a community counseling degree from other universities, a departmental interview is required, in addition to the University and Graduate School admission requirements. (See p. 35 for information regarding admission to the M.S. Community Counseling Program).

#### **NPP Program Purpose**

The Counseling and Educational Psychology team in the Department of Education is proposing a new degree program for students who have completed a Master's in Education in School Counseling or a Master's in Science in Community Counseling. The reason for this proposal is to address a financial aid issue faced by our students. Our proposal for an Ed.S. program is modeled after the approved Ed.S. program in School Psychology that SWOSU currently offers. In order to become a Licensed Professional Counselor (LPC) in Oklahoma, a qualifying degree is required, and both the Master of Education in School Counseling and the Master of Science in Community Counseling at SWOSU meet the licensing board's degree requirements.

However, after completing the qualifying degree, students must complete an additional 27 credit hours to be eligible for candidacy with the licensing board. Currently, this 27-hour coursework is coded as "LPC Curriculum," which is not recognized as a degree-seeking program for (Title IV) financial aid purposes. While this coursework is necessary for licensure, it is not eligible for financial aid under its current designation. Graduates who have completed a qualifying degree along with these additional 27 credit hours have successfully pursued licensure as mental health professionals, providing services to a diverse range of clients. Given the increasing demand for mental health professionals in Oklahoma, we propose a new degree program to cover these 27 additional hours, allowing students to access the financial aid they need to complete the required coursework and ultimately obtain licensure while pursuing an advanced specialist degree.

Currently, we have 43 students enrolled in LPC-required coursework, with 22 students having completed the Master's in Community Counseling and 21 having completed the Master's in School Counseling. These students are pursuing the final steps toward licensure but are unable to continue without access to financial aid. We urge your support for the proposed program to help ensure that these students can fulfill the requirements to become licensed mental health professionals and meet the growing mental health needs in Oklahoma.

Admission Requirements for Graduate Degree Program in Community Counseling

The Community Counseling graduate program is a two-tiered entry-level professional training program comprised of the M.S. Community Counseling and Ed.S. Professional Community Counseling (LPC Track). Admission into the Ed.S. Professional Community Counseling (LPC Track) Program requires completion of the M.S. Community Counseling Program. In addition, candidates must be approved for admission by the Education Department. Department bases its decision in part on the candidate's overall performance in the M.S. Community Counseling program. For those students completing a community counseling degree from other universities, a departmental interview is required, in addition to the University and Graduate School admission requirements. (See p. 35 for information regarding admission to the M.S. Community Counseling Program).

Placement into the LPC internship courses requires approval from the Departmental Internship/Practicum Approval Committee (IPAC).

NOTE: SUCCESSFUL COMPLETION OF THIS COURSE SEQUENCE QUALIFIES THE CANDIDATE FOR LICENSURE APPLICATION <u>ELIGIBILITY</u> under the current Oklahoma rules and regulations state law requires state application, including further supervision hours and successful completion of exams to be licensed.
