The University of Maine at Augusta (UMA) is seeking approval of a program proposal for an Associate of Arts in Psychology to begin in the Fall of 2026.

#### Rationale:

A dedicated PSY AA degree at UMA offers a specialized, customizable, and in-depth understanding of human behavior and mental processes, catering to those who are specifically interested in pursuing careers or further study in a variety of fields. A brief review of the Labor Statistics using the research site Lightcast (https://lightcast.io/) indicates that the job field of psychology is growing (comparison of 2020-2024 presented) and a field worth investing in here at UMA.

This degree will provide a good opportunity to collaborate with multiple UMS campuses on 2+2 AA to Baccalaureate pathways, and already have articulation agreements in the works with Psychology programs including UMF and USM, and are establishing several 2+2 pathways within UMA (such as with Mental Health and Human Services).

# Proposal for Associate of Arts in Psychology at University of Maine at Augusta

# **A. Project Objectives and Content**

In proposing an Associate of Arts degree in Psychology, our faculty are driven by the guiding principles of student-centered curricular needs as well as aligning our work with both UMA and UMS strategic plans, particularly the System's Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) of boosting enrollment, retention, transferability, economic & workforce development, research, and cross-campus collaboration. Psychology has no degree at UMA but is among its most popular minors and concentrations. We believe the creation of a standalone Psychology degree at the Associate's level would have several key benefits:

- Capitalize on the name recognition of psychology
- Fill a void within UMA and the UMS for an PSY AA degree
- Prepare students for the workforce and baccalaureate degree programs
- Fulfill a growing need for adult degree completion and transfer opportunities
- Create pathways to a multitude of baccalaureate degrees at UMA (e.g. mental health)
- Multiple opportunities for baccalaureate pathways to existing Psychology programs across the UMS (e.g. UMF, USM, YourPace)

The benefits of this proposed degree leverage existing faculty and courses at UMA, and would require no additional resources or faculty lines.

## **B. Evidence of Program Need**

Bringing to UMA a dedicated PSY AA degrees offers several advantages:

- Depth of Focus: A dedicated psychology degree would allow students to delve deeper into the specific theories, methodologies, and applications. <u>This degree has 8 PSY courses</u>, <u>whereas most</u> of UMA's degrees and concentrations require only one or two PSY courses (i.e. Introduction to Psychology).
- 2. **Specialization:** Psychology encompasses various subfields like neuroscience, community psychology, developmental psychology, social psychology and more. A dedicated PSY AA would allow students to specialize in a particular area of interest, preparing them for the workforce or further baccalaureate study.

- 3. **Practical Skills & Degree Pathways:** Our current roster of faculty would be able to offer students opportunities such as internships, research projects, and hands-on experiences, suited for entry-level jobs and further baccalaureate study, especially in professional programs.
- 4. **Out-of-state Enrollments:** A standalone PSY AA would enable us in the future to pursue recognition from the American Psychology Association (APA), boosting the potential for out-of-state enrollment.
- 5. **Online/Distance Learning Accessible:** This PSY AA would not only be the first of its kind in the UMS, it would also be completely online.

A dedicated PSY AA degree at UMA offers a specialized, customizable, and in-depth understanding of human behavior and mental processes, catering to those who are specifically interested in pursuing careers or further study in a variety of fields.

Market Analysis: A brief review of the Labor Statistics using the research site Lightcast (https://lightcast.io/) indicates that the job field of psychology is growing (comparison of 2020-2024 presented) and a field worth investing in here at UMA (see Table 1).

# C. Differentiation from similar existing UMS programs or how programs will complement each other

We examined Associate's degrees across the UMaine System primarily those at UMM, UMFK, and UMPI. We have determined that no competing degrees exist. We think this degree will provide a good opportunity to collaborate with multiple UMS campuses on 2+2 AA to Baccalaureate pathways, and already have articulation agreements in the works with Psychology programs including UMF and USM (see Appendix C), and are establishing several 2+2 pathways within UMA (such as with Mental Health and Human Services). We also note that the development of the <a href="UMS Unified Catalog">UMS Unified Catalog</a> also provides our students the ability to take PSY courses on other UMS campuses regardless of articulation agreements.

UMA's proposed PSY AA degree has a primary core of 24 PSY credits and is modeled after APA-approved psychology degree programs in the United States.

UMM's AA in Liberal Arts is very similar to UMA's existing degrees in Social Science, Liberal Studies, and Interdisciplinary Studies, that allow a choice of a 12-15 credit concentration. It has a liberal arts core with a 15 credit carveout for a concentration including Aquaculture, Audio/Media Production, Creative Writing, Marine Biology, Mental Health Rehabilitation Psychology, Visual Arts.

UMFK has AA and BS degrees in Behavioral Science. In Fall 2024, UMFK proposed a name change of their Behavioral Science program and degrees to Psychology. We support the work of our faculty colleagues at UMFK, and upon reviewing their program description and degree requirements, found that their Associate and Baccalaureate degrees are substantially different from our proposed PSY AA, with most of their classes more closely matching mental health, clinical and social work programs. Regardless, we have in the spirit of collaboration noted examples of transfer equivalencies should UMFK desire to partner with us on a 2+2 PSY degree pathway in the future.

# D. The role each participating university has in the collaborative effort

## E. Availability of resources and finances for sustainable program support

Our **projected enrollment** of the proposed degree is a maximum of 10 majors by the end of AY2027. No new support is needed based on these projections since the program leverages existing faculty and courses at UMA. See the Pro-Forma statement below for more information.

# F. Outline of the future program evaluation process

Per UMA guidelines, we will submit annual reports for the proposed associate's degree. These reports include standard quantitative metrics such enrollment data, student headcounts, number of majors, and number of graduates as well as detailed qualitative information on areas such as program growth, and identifying and addressing student barriers.

In addition to annual reports, the degree would undergo an external review every 5 years that guides the program. These external reviews provide feedback from major stakeholder groups including students, graduates, content experts, local workforce and agency partners, and Maine legislators.

The proposed degree would leverage existing support structures at both the program and institutional level such as UMA's Student Services Offices, EAB Early Alerts, and the Faculty Development Center.

# I. Pro Forma statement (maintained by the VCASA office)

The proposed degree aims to address educational and workforce needs central to UMA's mission and our student demographic by targeting the following Key Performance Indicators (KPIs):

- 1. Enrollment & Adult Degree Completion: We know anecdotally, and from the popularity of our PSY minor, that there is student interest and market demand for this degree. This demand is not currently being fulfilled by UMA and we think we are losing prospective students to other regional private colleges. We think this degree will attract both traditional and non-traditional students in Kennebec County by offering foundational coursework in psychology that is useful for students who wish to continue their educational attainment as well as non-traditional students who wish to complete their degree at UMA.
- 2. Retention: We believe there is a subset of UMA students who have a desire for a PSY degree that we are not currently meeting. Psychology is a popular field with substantial name recognition across the country, so it is not difficult for our students to find another university to earn a PSY degree. This demand is not currently being fulfilled by UMA and we think we are losing prospective students to other regional private colleges. In essence, we think this degree would capitalize on psychology's popularity in two ways: to potentially attract students to come to UMA as well as help retain a subset of current UMA students who want to earn a PSY degree.
- 3. **Economic/Workforce Development**: A good number of our students have families in the area and have established roots in Maine. The degree will equip graduates with essential skills for

- entry-level positions in various areas as social services and community outreach, addressing regional workforce shortages in Maine. With many of our students already working, this degree will also help them earn promotions and higher wages.
- 4. Research: Although UMA has no existing PSY degree, our expert faculty are engaged in both research and applied work. This work includes students and gives them a comparative advantage. For example, Dr. Kati Corlew's Psychology in Context Lab employs 2-6 students every year for research and engagement projects, and takes students to multiple conferences in Maine and across the country. In addition to research employment opportunities, students can engage in research projects as volunteers, and partake in various trainings and workshops in the field of psychology as part of their membership in the lab. Dr. Zach Roth serves as faculty advisor for the Community Garden Club, where UMA students gain experience in community engagement activities. These activities provide students weekly opportunities to implement the applied aspects of a psychology education. This takes many shapes, including leading a garden project using group dynamics principles or recruiting new volunteers and partner organizations using their knowledge of motivations and attitudes; PSY graduates often go on to lead community facing organizations where the ability to apply psychology in this manner is critical to their work.
- 5. Transferability: This degree would offer myriad transferability options. It is designed to ensure seamless transfer of credits to existing four-year psychology programs across the UMS as well as baccalaureate degrees at UMA, such as Social Science, Interdisciplinary Studies, and Mental Health and Human Services. Approval of this degree would also facilitate developing and maintaining "2+2" MOUs with partner programs across the UMS.
- 6. Fiscal/Infrastructure Sustainability: The program will leverage existing university resources, faculty, and facilities. We believe the implementation of this degree would be cost-effective and sustainability while bringing to UMA the opportunity to increase enrollment revenue and student retention. At UMA, psychology is a high revenue-generating discipline per credit hours taken with dedicated and established faculty. The creation of this degree does not create additional burdens on our faculty since it leverages existing courses and infrastructure. Ultimately, this proposed degree would allow UMA to capitalize on the existing popularity of psychology by counting PSY courses toward a dedicated PSY degree.
- 7. Institutional & Environmental Equity: By offering flexible course delivery the program will continue to promote access and equity, particularly for nontraditional students, aligning with UMA's mission and spirit of "meeting students where they're at." We also built the proposed degree on the foundation of Unified Accreditation and the belief that we can cooperate with other psychology programs within the UMS. Specifically, strengthening psychology at UMA means while promoting pathways to further study in PSY programs across the UMS.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The A.A. in Psychology at the University of Maine at Augusta predicts enrollment of approximately 5-7 new FTE students per year in the first three years, with an estimated \$21,000-\$81,000 per year in predicted tuition and fee revenue. This program will add approximately \$5,000 per year in new costs for marketing and related operational expenses. The AA in Psychology utilizes existing resources to create a new degree pathway for students pursuing a credential in the field of Psychology.
