- The County received a BRIC Grant to establish building codes in Lee County. A

Jared Yater walked the committee through the progress in compliance enforcement: Following are the highlights:

• There are roughly 60 non-compliant properties, with new cases regularly arising.

• Three citations

are pending, and two were issued in the month of January.

- He is currently working on 18 active building permits. Seven were closed in the in the last month.
- He has been asked to help with abandoned properties investigations. He is currently working with two properties in the Dixon area.

Solid Waste

Electronics collection is closed for the season and will reopen again in April. The contract is in place with Dynamic Lifecycle Innovations for recycling E-waste in 2025.

Per the host agreement with Republic Services, a letter was sent to the landfill with the newly calculated host fees based upon the CPI increase from December 2023 to December 2024. The host fee for 2024 will be \$2.44 per ton for the first 1000 tons in a day and \$3.01/ton for tons over 1000 in a day. This represents a 2.89% increase from last year.

MONTHLY ASSESSMENT OFFICE REPORT February 11, 2025 – County Services Committee


- The Board of Review met on January 21st, 23rd and 29th to review appeals filed against 2024 assessment values.
 - Attorney Gary Gehlbach was appointed to the BOR this past July. This was his first time participating in the review process. Gary's knowledge of real estate law, along with his long-standing reputation for being fair and kind in the community, are strong assets to the BOR. Along with Lori Erbes' knowledge as a realtor and Cole Olson's farming operations knowledge, our Board of Review is well equipped to handle the task of determining uniformity in assessments among all taxpayers in our taxing districts.
 - There were 74 appeals docketed (a total of 75 parcels appealed total).
 - Proposed Change Notices were emailed and mailed via standard mail on Monday, February 3rd.
 - Taxpayers who are not satisfied with those initial findings are instructed to contact our office to schedule a hearing in person or via teleconference with the BOR. Hearings will be held on February 18th and February 20th
 - This was the first time we had sent a courtesy copy of the notice via email. This was done to afford the taxpayer ample time to schedule a hearing if necessary.
 - Of the 75 parcels that appealed, 45 parcels were given an initial decrease in their assessment and 30 parcels were sent a notice indicating no change.
- We received our Notice of Confirmation from the Department of Revenue this week confirming a Tentative Equalization Factor of 1.0000. (Notice attached.)
 - While the Assessment Office has had to implement equalization factors internally that have been higher than in past years due to the increase in market value, it has been necessary to accomplish this 1.0 factor at the state level. Receiving the 1.0 factor validates the hard decisions made when we implemented the higher factors at the assessment level.
 - Calculating the factors at our local level enables us to distribute higher factors more equitably to the
 pockets of the county that are most undervalued vs. a blanket factor the state would apply to the entire
 county.
- Our office is transitioning from tax year 2024 to 2025. While we are wrapping up with the 2024 assessment appeals and getting ready to roll the tax file to the Clerk and Recorders office, we are beginning work in 2025 general assessment township work which will be Dixon and Palmyra Townships.
- GIS Dept: We will be meeting with Cloudpoint on Wednesday, 2/19 for a demonstration of two projects we are hoping to implement in the near future. Coming in the next year we will be moving away from ArcGIS Desktop version to ArcGIS Pro as Desktop will no longer be supported starting in 2026. Along with that, there will be some other changes that we are excited about that will improve the quality and integrity of our data. Also coming in 2025 is new arial photography by Eagleview. The flights will be taking place in April, and we should be receiving the new map layer by this fall.



Office of Professional Learning & Ed Services: Professional Learning & School Improvement

- ROE 47 Office of Professional Learning & Ed Services is currently auditing 10 school districts in Lee, Ogle & Whiteside counties. Regional Offices of Education are required to audit the professional development activities offered by districts at least once every five years.
- ROE 47 is partnering with the Illinois and National Science Teacher Association and the
 Illinois State Board of Education to provide statewide professional learning to support
 the implementation of the Illinois Science Standards in FY 25. Sessions (virtual, face
 to face, synchronous, asynchronous) launched January 27, 2025 with over 40
 participants and will continue through June 30, 2025.
- ROE 47 Office of PL & Ed Services has been awarded a NEW grant from the Illinois Deprtment of Public Health to promote youth mental health and suicide prevention. The Youth Aware of Mental Health (YAM) program is a school-based program that teaches students (grades 8-12) how to cope with mental health issues and prevent suicide. The program is delivered by certified facilitators in the classroom in a series of interactive sessions(role play, student discussions) over a few weeks. What the program does:
 - Helps students learn about mental health and suicide prevention
 - Teaches students how to identify and respond to mental health concerns
 - Helps students develop coping skills and emotional resilience
 - Encourages students to seek help for themselves and their friends
 - Helps students recognize the need for support
- Active schools with TRS-IA or RSSI plans to support trauma-responsive schools include: Amboy Central Elementary, Amboy Jr High School, Amboy High School, Center for Change, Chana Educ Center, Southside School (Morrison), Polo High School, Rock Falls Middle School, Dillon Elementary (RF), Merrill Elementary (RF), Riverdale (RF),

- Jefferson (Sterling), Lincoln Elementary (Sterling), Paw Paw Elementary & Jr High, Monroe Center, Sauk Valley Deanery.
- ROE 47 has launched a year-long social media campaign to raise awareness of trauma, reduce stigma, and promote resilience. Posts are available each Monday on Facebook.
- ROE 47 partners with Sterling Township's Elevate Youth Program and the Sterling-Rock Falls YMCA to provide an **afterschool program** for Challand Middle School students at the youth center. The program runs Monday Thursday from 3:00 5:30 p.m. We are serving 15 students each night. In the recent weeks students have really enjoyed using tinkercad and printing on the 3d printer. In the last week we have gained 2 new kids because their friends are excited about coming. Looking forward to planning summer activities with the group and working on study and homework skills.
- The Office Professional Learning & Educational Services is excited to announce that we have been awarded a **Preschool for ALL Expansion grant** through the Illinois State Board of Education. The grant proposed partnering with Dixon YMCA and Dreaming Tree preschool in Dixon to open four full day preschool classrooms serving 80 children ages 3-4.

IRIS supports warm hand-offs for families, closes the communication loop for referring organizations, tracks outcomes, and provides a clear data-driven picture of partner capacity to improve the process over time.

McKinney Vento Homeless Program

December is a month of joy for many; however, our McKinney Vento families may not be feeling the same. It adds additional stress to "celebrate" the holidays when the finances are very limited. We worked to connect our families with the community resources to help them celebrate to the fullest. It also puts additional stress on the budget because children are not getting breakfast and lunch at school. Food costs continue to rise and SNAP benefits do not keep pace. Our State grant dollars are limited as to the focus we are able to address, but all is being done to support our families and help to provide the best possible educational success for our students.

ACTIONS COMING FROM THE ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS –

1. Petition No. 24-P-1632 by Jeffrey A. Lewis as owner of certain real property identified as PIN 07-02-17-252-015 and commonly known as 763 Forest Park Dr., Dixon, Illinois, located on the east side of Forest Park Dr., approximately 470 feet east of Marine Dr., in Dixon Township, Lee County, Illinois, which is zoned R-2, Single Family Residential District, filed a Petition for Variance with the Lee County Zoning Office requesting it be granted a variance from Title 10, Chapter 9, Section 3: Bulk Regulations, specifically side/rear yard setback, for the purpose of adding on to an existing accessory building, due to exceptional topographical conditions. The parcel is 0.92 acres in size.

This petition was heard on February 6, 2025. Following the public hearing, the Zoning Board of Appeals' vote on the petition ended in a tie (2-2) which results in neither a recommendation to approve or deny the petition.

Pursuant to 55 ILCS 5/5-12009, any proposed variation which fails to receive the approval of the board of appeals shall not be passed except by the favorable vote of 3/4 of all the members of the county board.

The parcel is currently zoned Ag-1, Rural/Agricultural District and is 4.15 acres in size.

This petition was heard on February 6, 2025. Following the public hearing, the Zoning Board of Appeals voted unanimously (4-0) to recommend approval of this petition to the County Board.

The parcel is currently zoned Ag-1, Rural/Agricultural District.

ACTIONS COMING FROM THE PLANNING COMMISSION -

1. Petition No. 24-PC-77 by the Lee County Engineer, was filed in which Petitioner seeks to amend the text of Title 11: SUBDIVISION, FLOOD CONTROL AND STORM WATER MANAGEMENT, Chapter 4: STORM WATER MANAGEMENT, of the Lee County Code of Ordinances.

This petition was heard on February 3, 2025. Following the public hearing, the Regional Planning Commission voted unanimously (3-0) to recommend approval of this petition to the County Board.

ACTIONS GOING TO THE PLANNING COMMISSION -

1. Petition No. 24-PC-78 by the Lee County Zoning Administrator, was filed in which Petitioner seeks to amend the text of Title 10: ZONING REGULATIONS of the Lee County Code of Ordinances to replace Zoning Board of Appeals with Zoning Hearing Officer and to create standards for amending Special Use Permit that have been previously approved by the Lee County Board,



OTHER ACTIONS FROM THE ZONING OFFICE

We received exciting news that Lee County has been awarded funding through a BRIC grant that will allow the County to adopt building codes. We will be meeting with our representatives from Illinois Emergency Management Agency on Friday, February 14, 2025, to discuss what the next steps are for the County.

Last month, Maples Road Solar, LLC received its building permit for a 5 MW community solar project. This project is located on Maples Road, and they will be working onsite as the weather permits.

During the month of January 2025, the Zoning Office processed fourteen (14) building permits. Permit fees in the amount of \$1,018.40 were collected.

a) Budget/Contracts for FY 2026 (July 1, 2025 - June 30, 2026)

- (1) Funding Allocations for FY 2026 have been announced by IDOT and are as follows:
 - (a) 5311 Contract: \$283,450
 - (b) DOAP Contract: \$2,240,400
 - (c) 5311F Contract (I-88 and I-39): \$2,029,606

b) Rural Winnebago County Transit Services

- i) Working on Intergovernmental Agreement with Winnebago County to provide rural transit.
- ii) Separate agreement being finalized for the contractual hiring of a person to be the PCOM (oversight) of the rural transit services being provided.
- iii) The contractual budget proposed by IDOT for this new rural service is as follows:
 - (i) 5311 Contract: \$207,864
 - (ii) DOAP Contract: \$798,728

c) Vehicle Procurement

- (1) RMTD will be receiving six (6) vehicles (2 minivans, 4 light duty buses) via IDOT's 2020 CVP Application. Delivery could be as early as March. 2025.
- (2) RMTD collaboration with IDOT on a federal proposal to the Low/No Emission Grants.
 - (a) RMTD will procure two (2) electric buses via this proposal.

d) Hydrogen Fuel Feasibility Study

- i) The Request for Proposals for a Project Lead Consultant for the Hydrogen Fuel Feasibility Study was published on Friday, January 3, 2025. Responses to the RFP were due in by 1:00 PM last Friday, February 7, 2025.
- ii) IDOT State Planning and Research Program has awarded \$300,000 to assess the feasibility of using hydrogen fuel cell vehicles and hydrogen fuel in rural Illinois.

e) Service Contract Discussions

- i) Initial discussions on potential service contracts have been had with Rochelle Community Hospital as well as OSF Saint Katharine. Both of these are in the very preliminary stages, with good content from the initial meetings.
- A meeting is also being sought with Mercy Health, which opened an emergent clinic in the City of Dixon late in 2024.

f) Architectural/Engineering Firm / Oregon facility construction

- i) Pre-bid Concurrence paperwork has been submitted to IDOT for its review. Once concurred will allow for going out for the hiring of a General Contractor.
- ii) Larson and Darby, architectural firm out of Rockford, is the architect/engineering firm hired for the Oregon Construction project. This project is part of RMTD application under REBUILD 1

g) Transit Desert Grant / IDOT State Planning and Research

i) This project will look at the general "transportation needs" of residents in Lee and Ogle Counties, specifically those areas of the counties more remote in nature

- ii) The initial meeting of the Technical Advisory Committee was held Wednesday, January 8, 2025. The next meeting of the Technical Advisory Committee will likely be in March.
- iii) Next steps in the process, spearheaded by the NIU Center for Governmental Studies (NIU/CGS), will include interviews with key stakeholders.
- iv) NIU/CGS is also starting the review of existing data for transit deserts in the two-county region. A Public Survey is being developed by NIU/CGS with distribution in the near future.
- v) A series of Focus Groups will be established by NIU/CGS for the coming months.

h) Auditing Services

- RMTD and Wipfli, LLC have completed the annual Single Transportation Audit, as a requirement of RMTD's contract with IDOT.
- ii) The audit reviewed all transit funding sources for the period of July 1, 2023 June 30, 2024.
 - (1) Downstate Operating Assistance Program
 - (2) 5311 / 5311F for local and Intercity Bus operations
 - (3) CARES (Covid) funding

i) IT Services

The transition from DC Computers to Sundog IT is complete. The agreement with Sundog is a three-year contract with two (2) additional one-year options.

i) Pending Request for Bids / Intercity Bus

- An upcoming bid opportunity to operate Intercity Bus services on I-88 and I-39 will be forthcoming in the next six (6) months, with the selected operator beginning on July 1, 2025.
 - (1) Greyhound Bus Lines / FLIX are the current operator on both the I-88 Intercity Bus Route between Chicago and Davenport, Iowa, as well as the I-39 (I-90, and I-74) Route between Chicago and Danville, IL.

k) Request for Bids / Replacement Vehicles

RMTD has an initial draft of a Request for Proposals for two (2) (possibly three) Ford Transit type vehicles, and which has been shared with IDOT for their initial review. As of the date of this response there has been no additional feedback from IDOT on the RFP. This RFP will allow for the use of REBUILD 1 funding.
